HOLY SCRIPTURES

Our Epistle Lesson for March 29th is: Romans 8:6-11 (NIV)

⁶ The mind governed by the flesh is death, but the mind governed by the Spirit is life and peace. ⁷ The mind governed by the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law, nor can it do so. ⁸ Those who are in the realm of the flesh cannot please God.

⁹ You, however, are not in the realm of the flesh but are in the realm of the Spirit, if indeed the Spirit of God lives in you. And if anyone does not have the Spirit of Christ, they do not belong to Christ. ¹⁰ But if Christ is in you, then even though your body is subject to death because of sin, the Spirit gives life^[a] because of righteousness. ¹¹ And if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies because of^[b] his Spirit who lives in you.

Our Gospel Lesson for March 29th is: John 11:1-45 (NIV)

The Death of Lazarus

11 Now a man named Lazarus was sick. He was from Bethany, the village of Mary and her sister Martha. ² (This Mary, whose brother Lazarus now lay sick, was the same one who poured perfume on the Lord and wiped his feet with her hair.) ³ So the sisters sent word to Jesus, "Lord, the one you love is sick."

⁴ When he heard this, Jesus said, "This sickness will not end in death. No, it is for God's glory so that God's Son may be glorified through it." ⁵ Now Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus. ⁶ So when he heard that Lazarus was sick, he stayed where he was two more days,⁷ and then he said to his disciples, "Let us go back to Judea."

⁸ "But Rabbi," they said, "a short while ago the Jews there tried to stone you, and yet you are going back?"

⁹ Jesus answered, “Are there not twelve hours of daylight? Anyone who walks in the daytime will not stumble, for they see by this world’s light. ¹⁰ It is when a person walks at night that they stumble, for they have no light.”

¹¹ After he had said this, he went on to tell them, “Our friend Lazarus has fallen asleep; but I am going there to wake him up.”

¹² His disciples replied, “Lord, if he sleeps, he will get better.” ¹³ Jesus had been speaking of his death, but his disciples thought he meant natural sleep.

¹⁴ So then he told them plainly, “Lazarus is dead, ¹⁵ and for your sake I am glad I was not there, so that you may believe. But let us go to him.”

¹⁶ Then Thomas (also known as Didymus^[a]) said to the rest of the disciples, “Let us also go, that we may die with him.”

Jesus Comforts the Sisters of Lazarus

¹⁷ On his arrival, Jesus found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb for four days. ¹⁸ Now Bethany was less than two miles^[b] from Jerusalem, ¹⁹ and many Jews had come to Martha and Mary to comfort them in the loss of their brother. ²⁰ When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went out to meet him, but Mary stayed at home.

²¹ “Lord,” Martha said to Jesus, “if you had been here, my brother would not have died.²² But I know that even now God will give you whatever you ask.”

²³ Jesus said to her, “Your brother will rise again.”

²⁴ Martha answered, “I know he will rise again in the resurrection at the last day.”

²⁵ Jesus said to her, “I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die; ²⁶ and whoever lives by believing in me will never die. Do you believe this?”

²⁷ “Yes, Lord,” she replied, “I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, who is to come into the world.”

²⁸ After she had said this, she went back and called her sister Mary aside. “The Teacher is here,” she said, “and is asking for you.” ²⁹ When Mary heard this, she got up quickly and went to him. ³⁰ Now Jesus had not yet entered the village, but was still at the place where Martha had met

him. ³¹ When the Jews who had been with Mary in the house, comforting her, noticed how quickly she got up and went out, they followed her, supposing she was going to the tomb to mourn there.

³² When Mary reached the place where Jesus was and saw him, she fell at his feet and said, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died."

³³ When Jesus saw her weeping, and the Jews who had come along with her also weeping, he was deeply moved in spirit and troubled. ³⁴ "Where have you laid him?" he asked.

"Come and see, Lord," they replied.

³⁵ Jesus wept.

³⁶ Then the Jews said, "See how he loved him!"

³⁷ But some of them said, "Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?"

Jesus Raises Lazarus From the Dead

³⁸ Jesus, once more deeply moved, came to the tomb. It was a cave with a stone laid across the entrance. ³⁹ "Take away the stone," he said.

"But, Lord," said Martha, the sister of the dead man, "by this time there is a bad odor, for he has been there four days."

⁴⁰ Then Jesus said, "Did I not tell you that if you believe, you will see the glory of God?"

⁴¹ So they took away the stone. Then Jesus looked up and said, "Father, I thank you that you have heard me. ⁴² I knew that you always hear me, but I said this for the benefit of the people standing here, that they may believe that you sent me."

⁴³ When he had said this, Jesus called in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" ⁴⁴ The dead man came out, his hands and feet wrapped with strips of linen, and a cloth around his face.

Jesus said to them, "Take off the grave clothes and let him go."

Meditation

Today, it seems, every time we turn on the television, open the newspaper, visit an internet site we get more bad news about the Corona Virus Pandemic. In many respects we are in a crisis. Many of us are fearful and that is understandable.

Today's gospel lesson is particularly pertinent; there is a valuable lesson here as we see a family experiencing a crisis. Lazarus and his sisters, Martha and Mary, were close personal friends of Jesus. Jesus spent time in their home. He would stop to visit with Mary, Martha and Lazarus whenever he passed through. They had shared many enjoyable evenings together.

Jesus was teaching one day when word came that Lazarus was sick and would probably die: "Lord, he whom you love is ill." Certainly, Jesus would come at once to the aid of his sick friend. Jesus was Lazarus' last hope. Jesus had healed other people from their illnesses. Certainly, he would want to heal his friend.

Instead of going at once to Lazarus, however, Jesus stayed where he was for two more days. What doesn't make sense is that Jesus was only two miles away. He could have been with Lazarus in a matter of minutes. Instead he purposely stayed where he was for two more days. How would you feel in today's situation if you or a loved one went to the Emergency Room of the hospital and had to wait forty-eight hours for the doctor to show up and treat you? We would be outraged. If a loved one died while waiting two days for the doctor we would be more than outraged, we would probably want to sue someone who was held responsible.

We are given a clue, though, that something extraordinary is about to take place. When Jesus heard that Lazarus was ill he said, "This illness does not lead to death; rather it is for God's glory, so that the Son of God may be glorified through it." By the time Jesus finally made his way to the home of Martha and Mary, their brother was already dead.

Our gospel lesson is more than just a story about a family in crisis. It is about a world that is in crisis, and the purpose of the story is to show us that Jesus is the Resurrection and the Life."

Jesus and his disciples made their way to Bethany. When Martha heard that Jesus was approaching, she went running out to meet him. Her first words to Jesus were, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died." Jesus assured her, "Your brother will rise again." Martha agreed with Jesus thinking he meant the last day. Jesus replied, "I am the

Resurrection and the Life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and whoever lives and believes in me will never die." Jesus asked Martha if she believed what he told her. Martha replied, "Yes, Lord."

The people who followed her out to meet Jesus also began weeping and wailing. Jesus was deeply moved by what he saw, and he openly wept as well. The people saw Jesus weeping and said, "See how he loved him!" The crowd reacted sympathetically to Jesus but had no understanding of who he really was. Jesus' tears were different from the tears of the people. Jesus' tears were for the suffering of Lazarus and his family, but they were also for the human situation which leads to faithless behavior.

Jesus wanted them to know that eternal life is available to every one of us here and now. We do not have to wait for some distant event to receive eternal life. The relationship we have with Jesus Christ, who is the resurrection and the life, is what leads us to eternal life. What's most important in our lives is the relationship we have with Jesus. We can live our lives as victors and not victims when we have a right relationship with Jesus

This was Jesus' greatest miracle, here he shows us that he has conquered death. Standing in front of the tomb Jesus told the crowd, "Take away the stone." Martha, with her lack of confidence in Jesus' life-giving power, protested, "Lord, already there is a stench because he has been dead four days." Jesus reminded her, "Did I not tell you that if you believed you would see the glory of God." They removed the stone in front of the tomb. Jesus looked up to heaven and prayed to God. Then Jesus cried out in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" And Lazarus walked out of the tomb with his "hands and feet bound with strips of cloth and his face wrapped in cloth." Jesus had performed his greatest of all signs in the presence of the people so that they would believe in him.

Jesus said those liberating words, "Unbind him, and let him go." The most amazing thing about eternal life here and now is that we can live each day in faith, no longer living in fear of dying. Professional golfer Lee Trevino was struck by lightning while he was playing in a tournament. In describing that experience he said, "When I got killed by lightning I realized the passage from life is a tremendous pleasure."

Lee Trevino was sitting under a tree when lightning hit. "It bolted my arms and legs out stiff, jerked me off the ground," he recalls, "and killed me. I knew I was dead. There was no pain. Everything turned a warm, gentle orange color. I saw my mama who had been dead for years. I saw other people from my life. It was a newsreel like you read about " my life passing

before my eyes. But it was so pleasant, so wonderful, I felt great. I thought, boy this dying is really fun. It's when I woke up in the hospital badly burned and in pain that I knew I had come back to life again for some reason." Eternal life means that we do not have to live our lives fearing death. Lee Trevino said after his experience, "There's no reason to fear death."

The new life that Jesus gave Lazarus was only temporary. He would one day die again. But the life that Jesus Christ offers each one of us, the life that is available to us here and now is different. With eternal life we will always be with Jesus. We can live our lives knowing that Jesus has conquered death and has given us new life.

Dr. Don Webb, president emeritus of Centenary College, was born in Wales and served in the British Navy before coming to America to begin his ministry. He was proud to be named captain of H.M.S. Switha. He wanted to impress the crew with how wise and brave he was. Their first assignment was to check the anchors that held the buoys in place, and the only way to do this was to send down a deep-sea diver. Don Webb was told that the previous captain always liked to go down first.

The only problem was that Don Webb had never gone deep sea diving and didn't know the first thing about it. He was unable to admit his inadequacy and ask for help. He told his crew, "Of course, I want to go down first - wouldn't have it any other way!" Don was actually scared to death as he put on the heavy suit, the thick gloves, the leaded shoes, and the helmet. He jumped overboard and slowly sank to the ocean floor. On the ocean floor he realized that he did not know how to walk. He panicked and fell forward, face down in the mud, and worst of all he let go of the lifeline. He remembered what his men had said, "Whatever you do Cap'n, don't let go of this. If you need help, just give her a tug!"

There he was lying on the ocean floor, stuck, unable to move. "This is it!" he thought to himself. "This is how it all ends." After several minutes which must have seemed like an eternity, Don Webb felt a gentle touch on his shoulder. The crew sensed that he had lost his lifeline and was in trouble. An experienced diver came down to save him "to pick him up, to unstick him from the mud, to give back his lifeline, to show him how to walk and survive."

Jesus has rescued us from sin and death, giving us new life. We are rescued from above just as Captain Webb was. Eternal life begins here and now because we place our faith in Jesus, the giver of life; this gives us the courage to face the current crisis and those to come.

Affirmation of Faith

We believe that our lives are held within the encircling love of God, who knows our names and recognizes our deepest needs.

We believe that Christ is the divine child of the living God, and that his grace is like living waters that can never be exhausted.

We believe in the birthing, renewing, enabling spirit of God who yearns over our welfare as a mother yearns for her child.

We believe that God is in the arid desert as well as in green pastures, and that hard times and discipline are also times that will strengthen our faith.

We believe that our journey has a purpose and a destination, and that our path leads to a human glory we cannot yet imagine.

We believe that in the church we are fellow pilgrims on the road, and that we are called to love one another as God loves us.

This is our faith, and we are humbled to profess it in the name of Jesus the Christ. Amen.

Prayer

God of grace, we come together to this time of prayer with thanksgiving. We come into your presence with gratitude, O God, that you hear our prayers.

Help us when we struggle to carry the cross of Christ faithfully this season. For those who tread on ground that is rocky with instability in their health, homes or jobs, we ask for your calming presence. For those who cannot find their way in the quagmire of grief and loss, we ask for the light of the Lord to guide them on the journey. For those who are ill or providing care for them, we ask for the peaceful serenity of the Holy Spirit. We know that to carry the cross is a commitment to a way of life; we try to carry the cross proudly. But sometimes we falter. Help us in our travels that we might walk steadfast and sure to Jerusalem -- and beyond. Amen.
